PREVENTING RELAPSE

N THE FELLOWSHIP, I eventually came to realize I had a drinking problem and that I am an alcoholic. I came to AA to get help to stop drinking and subsequently live my life without alcohol.

However, no matter the length of my sobriety there will be occasions, perhaps on a hot, blue-skied, sunny day, when the thought of a long, cold gin & tonic or a cooling draught of beer enters my mind – after all, I am an alcoholic!

The danger arises when this <u>THOUGHT</u> of having a drink turns into a <u>FEELING</u> that I <u>WANT</u> a drink and there are various ways of avoiding this scenario:-

- 1) Firstly, and most importantly, I have to not only admit that I am an alcoholic, but fully ACCEPT that I cannot drink like ordinary people. I have an illness which, left to take its own course, will eventually kill me.
- 2) I try to begin each day with a quiet time (I get up 10 minutes earlier if necessary). If like me, you have found a Higher Power, a prayer, asking for help and protection from the temptation to drink, can give me enormous spiritual strength.

3) Not drinking <u>"one day at a time"</u> can be life-changing. The past is gone, and nothing on earth can bring it back or change it. Tomorrow is unknown and yet to come. So I should try to live <u>"just for today"</u> and only deal with today's problems.



- 4) If the *thought* of a drink turns into *wanting* a drink, I PICK UP THE PHONEI Sponsors or any other member of the Fellowship, are there to help me. If nobody is home I can ring the AA Helpline I don't try to deal with the problem alone.
- 5) When I think of how "nice" it would be to have a drink I would do well to remember my last "drunk" where was I? What happened? How did I feel? Just how bad was that withdrawal?

- 6) I can, from time to time, feel sorry for myself and go into what is called in AA, a "pitypot". I need to become aware of myself and my moods and when I start to feel "self-pity" I need to think of everything I have to be grateful for, and be thankful for all my blessings, no matter how small.
- 7) We have all heard at meetings about the acronym: H.A.L.T. Halt means STOP stop and think. When I stop drinking I have to learn to start taking good care of myself both physically and emotionally.
- a) <u>HUNGRY</u> I don't let hunger become a problem. I eat balanced meals with nourishing food.
- b) ANGRY I avoid situations which cause anger, stress or resentment. If I find myself in a situation where anger arises in me, I can walk away or take a short break.
- c) LONELY this illness wants to get me on my own. I am more likely to drink when I am lonely and feeling sorry for myself. I ring somebody or go to a meeting.
- d) <u>TIRED</u> the longer I am off the booze the better my sleep patterns are. I avoid taking on too much and ensure that I get a good night's sleep.
- **8) AVOID THE FIRST DRINK** at all costs. Nothing, but

nothing, will improve or change by having a drink. I remember that, for me as an alcoholic, one drink is too many and one hundred are never enough.

- 9) <u>DON'T ISOLATE</u> I share my problems and don't try to handle the "downs" of life alone. I go to a meeting and talk to others or ring someone.
- **10) MEETINGS.** meetings, meetings I can never go to too many meetings it's my fix, my medicine, my lifeline. "Keep coming back" isn't an idle catchphrase it could save my life!!

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FOUR MONTHS...AND STILL COUNTING.....

HERE'S NO CHIP for four months' sobriety. For three, yes. Six, too. But nothing to mark 120 days on the wagon. Funny how those shiny little discs become so important in the early days of recovery.

Still, chip or no, the days keep mounting and I keep counting. And yes, there are achievements to be

recognised. My body no longer stirs me at three in the morning, demanding an alcohol infusion, tossing and turning me for hours on end if I don't comply.

No longer is there an eight-o'clock glass of wine hidden from the kids behind the morning newspaper (a broadsheet is a better screen than a tabloid —

and a better read!). No longer the morning loathing, that lack of self-worth and absence of motivation that could only be eased with 750 mls of rosado fully-consumed by 10 am.

Four months on, the body is still trying to adjust. As the liver throws off the years of accumulated toxins the skin still

itches somewhat (quite normal, I understand, according to *Wikipedia*). The insipient spots are now handled readily by *Clean and Clear*. And the liver blotches are fading nicely, thank you. But I am, by no means, home free.

The little voice that once urged me on to the next glass has changed tactics. It now wants to heap me with praise for

120 days of abstinence, reminding me that I wasn't a car-crasher or wifebeater or a fall-down, piss-in-my-pants drunk — just a soul who sometimes had one or two too many. I know

better.

And I know because every Monday evening I listen to the resonant stories of people whose experiences are not

so different to mine — and their voices are far louder than any in my head.

I know from this group of good souls that our recovery is a fragile one, and only through their example can I retain my tenuous cling to sobriety. Through them, I know there is no 'home free'. Without them, I would likely be lost, back to that

alcohol-fueled world that has never done me much service.

Four months on, I am still attending just one meeting a week, and that is probably not enough. I read the literature sparingly, and that's definitely not enough.

But as one member of our group alluded last week, the Fellowship grows on you. I am beginning to get past the natural defiance to phrases like "...a Power greater than ourselves..." and "... God, as we understand Him". The ego is diminishing, and step-by-step I'm starting to map the program on to my life in a comfortable way.

Another member of our group just celebrated 31 years of sobriety. He got his chip, and rightly so.

Eleven-thousand-three-hundred and fifteen alcohol-free days is a stunning achievement — a bright, shining example deserving serious recognition.

My humble 120 pales in comparison, yet it is a start. So I'll quit my harping and celebrate my four-month birthday quietly, without applause or a sparkling disc, and just keep on counting the days, one at a time.

HOW WE GOT TO BE WHERE WE ARE



HERE ARE currently more than 2,000,000 members in AAI Well, just where do we, here in Spain living as ex-pats on the Costa Blanca, fit into this vast worldwide fellowship?

Many of us may have read the AA literature (both from the UK and the USA) describing the structure of AA – the Groups, Intergroups, Areas/Regions, and General Service Offices — but felt that none of it seems to match exactly what we have here on the Costa Blanca.

So what is this CBIC we hear about in our business meetings and why did we become part of it? Hopefully the following will help answer some of those questions:

Q. What does CBIC stand for?

A. Costa Blanca International Committee

Q. Why is CBIC an International Committee and not an Intergroup?

A. AA Groups on the Costa Blanca are affiliated to our host nation Spanish AA. The Costa Blanca comes under Spanish Area 21, based in Alicante, to which all the local individual Spanish Groups send their Group Service Representative (GSR or RSG in Spanish).

The Spanish call their bi-monthly meetings an Area Assembly rather than an Intergroup but they are in effect the same. Each of our groups are at liberty to send their GSR directly to the Area Assembly where they would, as normal, have individual voting rights.

However, and here's the crunch, naturally the Assemblies are held in Spanish and unless the GSR is fluent in the language they would be unable to participate fully.

THAT'S WHY the Costa Blanca International Committee was set up in order to obtain an informed conscience of all the non-Spanish speaking groups that could then be taken to the Area Assembly by just one Representative who needs to be bi-lingual.

Q. Why don't we come under CER (Central European Region) which is Region 15 of AA Great Britain as many other English-speaking ex-pat groups in Europe do?

A. Costa Blanca International Committee is, just that! **International**.

We are not just English-speaking — we represent meetings held in German, Scandinavian, Finnish, and Flemish. And even where we are "English-Speaking", a number of members actually come from Ireland!

So there was the dilemma!

When AA got itself 'organised' (God forbid) on the Costa Blanca a good few years ago now, it was decided that rather than continuously debate in which country's GSO a representative of all the meetings should participate and where the 7th Tradition funds should be sent, they agreed, instead, to support the host nation, Spanish AA, who were, and still are, extremely short of funding.

So now you know why it is, as it is. For now that is!
